On the Tanzanian shore of Lake Tanganyika, TNC is empowering local communities and leadership to implement community-led conservation initiatives to advance the conservation process of resources of Lake Tanganyika and increase people's livelihoods opportunities. In that regard, to reduce the fishing pressure on Lake Tanganyika, TNC wishes to support local population develop alternative livelihoods options through establishment of Community Conservation Banks (COCOBA).

The COCOBA model aims to support efforts being implemented by various conservation partners by way of reducing pressure on natural resources and providing alternative economic activities. JKCI now do transcatheter aortic valve implantation procedure for the elderly

HEAVY investment made by the government has made the Jakaya Kikwete Cardiac Institute (JKCI) to easily do transcatheter aortic valve implantation procedure (TAVI) for the elderly aged between 75 and 80 vears.

Dr John Jingu (pictured), permanent secretary in the ministry of Health made the remarks yesterday in Dar es Salaam, when visited three JKCI patients, who had their coronary artery valve replaced with a small hole without opening the chest, which is the first in the country and second in Sub-Saharan Africa.

He said that the move is after ongoing investments made in the sector, including the allocation of 5bn/- for the training of specialists and super specialists) abroad, who are among the successful TAVI.

"Next year, 10.9bn/- will be allocated to 700 specialists from different hospitals in the country, including JKCI, for the training of specialists in specialized and specialist services," said Dr Jingu.

He aligned the benefits of investment in the sector, which has come from JKCI is an income of 920m/for the period from July to Decemand a half to two hours per person



ber, this year, due to income from 3,000 patients who were treated from inside and outside about 20 countries.

"This investment saves lives, the cost is not only for us but also for neighboring countries, and there are also those who come from outside the continent of Africa. We will continue to launch services like this, the TAVI service. When I did research I found out that it is done in South Africa and here in Tanzania, in Sub-Saharan Africa," said Dr Jingu.

JKCI Executive Director Dr Peter Kisenge said three adults between the ages of 75 and 80 have received the service, for approximately one

and the cost is 80m/- for each patient.

Cardiologist, Dr Tatizo Waane said that the TAVI service reduces the harm to the patient, because it takes less than two days, treatment and the patient is discharged.

Cardiologist, from Stancare hospital in India, Dr Ashishkumar Mandalay, together with his colleagues, said that the implementation of the TAVI service and cooperation with JKCI, has increased their experience.

He said that the presence of modern medical equipment has made the service successful, also saying that the local champions' skills helped the surgery to be done easily.
